Puzzles and Games



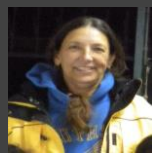
Take a break from studying, grab some friends, and relax with some of our puzzles and games! Find them on the Eastern side (close to the large windows) of the library.

Over the years I have worked and helped many students, and in exchange, each student has imparted their knowledge to me. The gift of learning new things is the best part of my job.

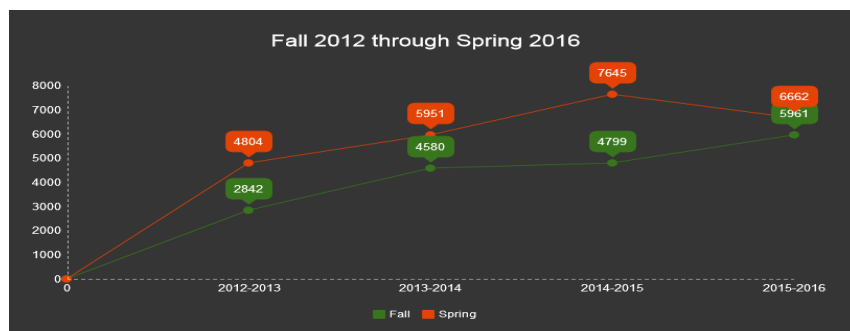

Open Access Week

An open access scholarly journal increases the exposure of published research. These scholarly journals are free to all readers whether or not they are associated with an academic or government institution.

According to openaccessweek.org, "Open Access Week [October 24-30], a global event now entering its eighth year, is an opportunity for the academic and research community to continue to learn about the potential benefits of Open Access, to share what they've learned with colleagues, and to help inspire wider participation in helping to make Open Access a new norm in scholarship and research."

Some open access journals can be found on the Directory of Open Access Journal website (doaj.org), where there are currently over 9,000 journals and over 2.3 Million articles to browse.

Archives and Special Collections

Archives and Special Collections had a very eventful fall semester. In addition to the highly successful Archives Week, it also sponsored a lecture in the La Verne Academy Series, hosted by Al Clark. The lecture focused on Bill Neill, former Professor of Communications, who donated 60 hours of video footage of ULV's history to Archives and Special Collections. At the event, Professor of Communications Mike Laponis introduced Neill, who spoke about two short films shown to a packed audience.

Tragically, Bill Neill passed away in November. His tremendous gift of his video archive to Wilson Library (now located on YouTube) allows students an in-depth overview of the school's past. The University can never repay him for the lifetime he devoted to documenting its past. We will always be grateful for the countless hours he spent documenting our past for future generations. Thank you, Bill. We will miss you.

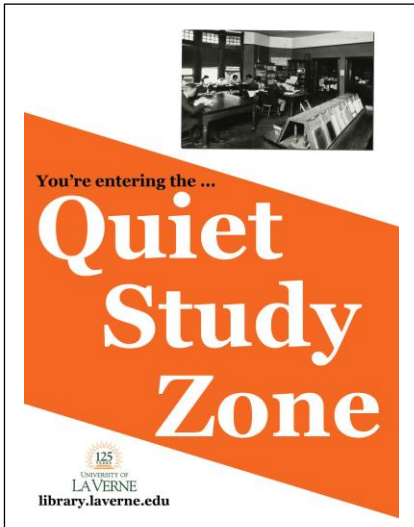

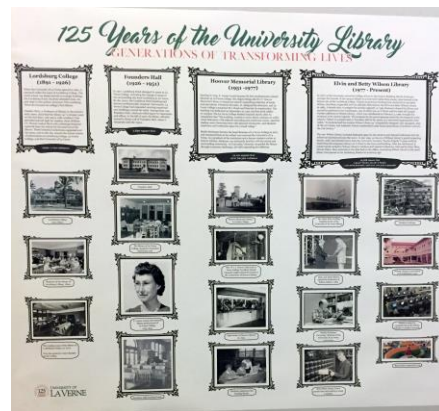
Quiet Study Zone
